DIRECT SUPPORT PROFESSIONALS

The Indiana Family & Social Services Administration is excited to launch a critical short-term wages and benefit strategy in the form of a Direct Services Workforce Investment grant to financially support frontline staff who provide direct care and support for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The Arc of Wabash County applied and is being awarded funds for our frontline staff. We are excited to have the opportunity to recognize and reward our frontline staff with bonuses in April, July and October.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY

In 1987 President Ronald Reagan issued a public proclamation urging Americans to provide individuals with developmental disabilities "the encouragement and opportunities they need to lead productive lives and to achieve their full potential." While there has been significant and positive change in the decades since, many challenges remain for this vulnerable population.

Recent estimates show that about 2% of the US population has one or more developmental disabilities. That means there may be over 600 Wabash County citizens living with an intellectual or developmental disability.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), developmental disabilities are defined as impairments in physical, learning, language or behavior areas, and include:

- · Autism Spectrum Disorders
- · Cerebral Palsy
- Attention- Deficit/ Hyperactivity Disorder
- Learning or Intellectual Disabilities
- Hearing Loss
- Vision Impairment
- · Down Syndrome
- · Traumatic Brain Injury
- · Other Developmental Delays
